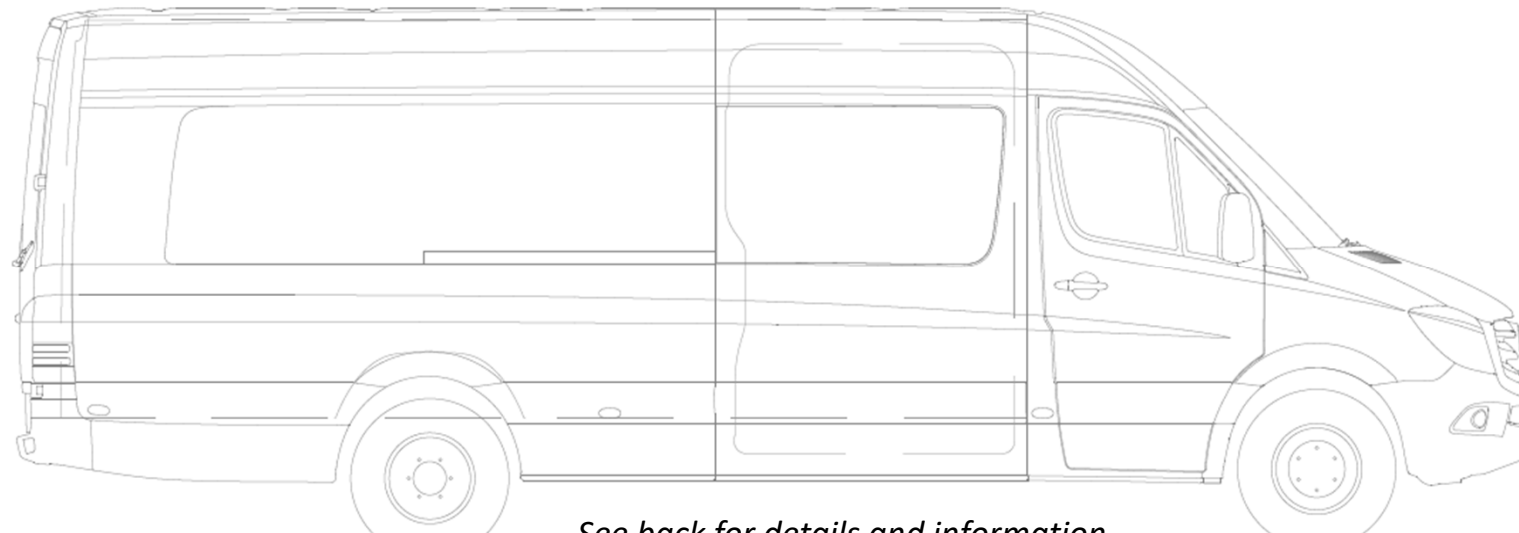
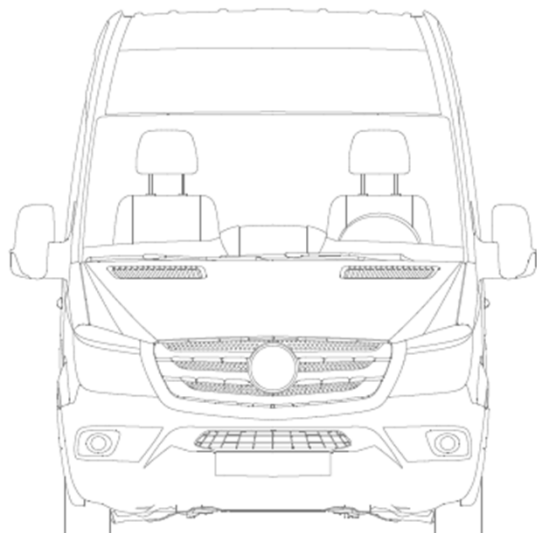

Design Concept Contest Rules

Please read all rules carefully prior to submitting your contest entry.

Design concept contest entries will be accepted Monday, July 25, 2022 through Saturday, August 20, 2022 at 5:00PM. Late submissions will not be accepted. You may submit your design concept entry in the following ways: (1) mail your entry form to Health & Community Services – Van Design Entry, PO Box 607, Friday Harbor, WA 98250; (2) bring your entry form by our office at 145 Rhone Street, Friday Harbor, WA 98250; (3) scan and email your entry form to LuciBWellnessVan@sanjuanco.com; (4) fax your entry form to 360-378-7036; or (5) bring your entry form to our Health & Community Services booth at the San Juan County Fair in Friday Harbor during the fair hours between Wednesday, August 17, 2022 and Saturday, August 20, 2022 at 5:00PM.

Contest entries will be reviewed beginning on Monday, August 22, 2022. The winner of the contest will be announced on or after Friday, August 26, 2022 via our website and the Lucy B Community Wellness Van Facebook page. Health & Community Services Department staff will vote on the entries and will make a final decision on the winning entry once all entries have been reviewed and considered.

The round San Juan County Washington logo (above) must be included in your design and must be visible on both sides of the van. The “Health & Community Services Department” name and the van name (“Luci B Community Wellness Van”) must be included in your design on at least one side or the back. Please note that **this is a concept design only**. The actual van graphic design will be **BASED** on the winning design concept and may not be displayed on the van exactly as the design that was submitted. **All San Juan County residents are invited to apply. Children under the age of 18 years must have parent permission to submit a contest entry.** By submitting your entry into this design concept contest, you release all claim to the designs and authorize San Juan County to use your design and design concepts without monetary compensation. The winner of the design concept contest will be recognized for their contribution to the new community wellness van project.

We are naming our community wellness van after **Lucinda Elizabeth Stewart Boyce** (1835-1916). Lucinda Boyce served as a community leader on San Juan Island and as a role model for hundreds of women who braved the strenuous conditions of the island’s early settlement years. She arrived on San Juan Island in 1860—a dozen years before the San Juan Islands became Washington’s San Juan County. Lucinda Boyce was a compassionate nurse and midwife, delivering more than 500 babies—while bearing nine more of her own—and venturing out in any weather and to outer islands to care for the sick and injured. Endurance, ingenuity, and a rugged physical and mental disposition were necessary for settler women to survive in the early days—but Lucinda didn’t just endure, she thrived. Lucinda was referred to as “First Lady of the San Juans.” She stepped up and took on the roles of doctor, nurse, and midwife. Lucinda administered care to all who needed it, responding to medical calls any time of the night or day—regardless of the distance or weather. She would ride horseback or drive a buggy over harsh terrain, paddle a canoe or take a rowboat to Orcas, Shaw, Stuart or Waldron. Lucinda was known for her kindness and compassion to all. We’ve chosen to name our new community wellness van “Luci B” in honor of Lucinda Boyce. We believe our team of public health staff carry on Lucinda’s mission and embody her determination, indomitable spirit, warmth, joy of living, and kindness for all persons—working to overcome all obstacles and promote wellness for those living in the San Juan Islands.
